## Feral Vs Stray Cats

Feral cats are un-socialized cats that are afraid of people and keep their distance. They do not want to be pets and prefer to live outside, which is their home.

Stray cats were former pets and may seek human attention. The longer they stay outside, the more feral they become. Pets that are not fixed create feral cats.

## Community Cats

Cats who live outdoors are called community cats or free-roaming cats. A group of outside cats is known as a colony. Colonies form around a food or water source. Survival is difficult as they fight over food, territory and mates.

## Trap-Neuter-Return

TNR, or Trap -Neuter- Return, is the most effective and humane method of controlling outside cat populations. With TNR, cats are trapped, spayed or neutered, vaccinated against rabies and ear-tipped for identification. After recovery, the cats are returned to where they were trapped.

After TNR, the mating behaviors of fighting and yowling stop. Cats will still spray to mark their territory but the smell is greatly diminished. Sterilized and vaccinated cats, many times will keep unsterilized cats out of their territory and with no kittens born, the numbers stabilize and start to decrease.

Cats in a managed colony can live safe and healthy lives, while providing free rodent control for their caretakers.

## TNR in San Antonio

San Antonio has a very large outside cat population. Our warm climate allows cats to reproduce year-round. Pets that are not fixed get out and get pregnant. We also have a high abandonment rate where people move away and leave their pets behind.

Our city officials recognize and support TNR as the solution to overpopulation and we invite the citizens of San Antonio to do the same. *Spayed or neutered outside cats are legal in San Antonio* . ## Our Programs

TNR Class – Our 65-minute online training class prepares you to trap cats safely, gives low cost spay/neuter options, and explains how and why TNR works.

Trap Loans - We loan traps free of charge to those who have completed the above training. There is a refundable deposit.

Helpline - Leave a message on our Helpline and a volunteer will call you back within 24 hours. We provide information and resources to help with your cat situation, but we cannot remove them.

Spay/Neuter Subsidy - We feel it is imperative to make TNR as affordable as possible for everyone who wants to help end the suffering of outside cats and kittens. The low cost fee at our partner clinics includes surgery, rabies and FVRCP vaccinations and ear-tip.

Adoption - We rescue kittens and friendly strays that are placed in our home-based foster program and adopted via our Petco and PetSmart stores found on our website.

Cat Crisis Fund - We can assist with vet bills from Good Samaritans and colony caretakers when cats require urgent care for illness or injury, as our resources allow.

Trapper Team - For those who are unable to trap due to age or disability, we have volunteers who may be able to help people who are feeding and want to stop the breeding. This is not a free service.
